



Pedagogical research seems to ignore the role of education, which largely reflects the situation of mothers and their own DTRs. Interestingly, even the most radical scholars, such as Pedagogy.com's founder, Jim Morrison, seem to accept the status quo, and have, for example, recommended that students "choose to support their parents".¹ This seems striking given the other Pedagogy.com founders' critical positions on the issue.

Individuals' personality brings positive effects although certain types of personalities, however, can have negative effects. Individuals who are more outgoing, friendly, energetic, enthusiastic and have a positive attitude, are more likely to be successful. However, individuals who are less outgoing, less friendly, less energetic, less enthusiastic and have a negative attitude, are less likely to be successful. This study found that individuals with a positive personality had higher job satisfaction than individuals with a negative personality.

According to the theory of "Needs" by Deci and Ryan (1985), individuals with a positive personality tend to have higher levels of self-determination, autonomy, competence, relatedness, and meaning. These factors are important in the development of job satisfaction (Hofmann et al., 2009). Hofmann et al. (2009) found that job satisfaction was negatively associated with low performance, whereas job satisfaction was positively associated with high performance. Thus, it is important to understand the relationship between job satisfaction and job performance. Therefore, the purpose of this study is to examine the relationship between job satisfaction and job performance.

Individuals' personality influences job satisfaction because the needs of individuals differ from one another. Therefore, the theory of "Needs" can be used to explain the relationship between job satisfaction and job performance.
